## An anonymous letter sent to Sir Peter Henry Edlin.

The letter is undated but the envelope is post marked 16<sup>th</sup> September 1878 and again 17<sup>th</sup> September 1878. It was originally sent to the Sessions House but was re-directed to the home address of Sir Peter. It should be noted that the handwriting on the envelope is different to that on the letter.
